"Students deserve to feel safe on campus and should not have to worry about walking back to their residence hall at night," said Pelligrini. "If an incident occurs in the parking lot, these new cameras will be utilized to help students file reports and get their property back."

While Huettenmeyer still doesn't have his car back, it is a huge relief to him as well as other Missouri State students that precautions are being taken so that they won't have to worry about going through the same thing.
